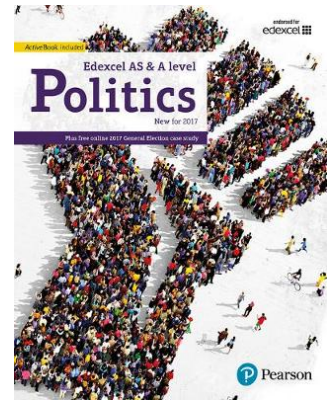


A-level Politics transition project
